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Key considerations and recommendations from the seed industry:

Seed supply

Demand for certified organic seed continues to rise. However, in some instances limited availability remains a barrier to growth. ASF recommends maintaining transitional arrangements that allow for the use of untreated, non-organic seeds where certified organic seed is unavailable, ensuring continuity in supply chains. This is in line with the current National Standard for Organic and Bio-Dynamic Produce.

To support trade and competitiveness, organic standards must align with international frameworks, such as those of the EU and USDA. This will reduce barriers to market access and streamline compliance for Australian producers.

The Bill should include clear and precise definitions of organic standards and certification criteria to minimise ambiguity and ensure practical implementation.

Coexistence of production systems

The Australian agriculture industry has long upheld the coexistence of organic, conventional, and gene tech production systems. Effective coexistence safeguards consumer choice, protects market access, and promotes sustainable agriculture.

As this Bill states, Australia is the last nation in the OECD to not have a regulatory framework for the use of the word 'organic' in a domestic context.

This Bill will assist with consumer confidence in organic products and assist businesses to appropriately and accurately market their produce and products, potentially leading to market growth. This can – and must – be achieved without diminishing market access for other segments of industry.

ASF supports policies that promote fairness and equity across all seed and or production systems, ensuring no sector experiences a disproportionate loss of market share.

Research and development

Another benefit of the National Organic Standard Bill 2024 could be future investment in R&D to meet the needs of organic farming systems, including the development of high-performing organic seed varieties tailored to Australian conditions. Such initiatives could lead to more diverse and resilient varieties available to producers and consumers.



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Compliance and market confidence

Strong enforcement of organic standards is critical to maintaining consumer trust. However, compliance measures must remain practical and cost-effective, particularly for small and medium enterprises (SMEs).

ASF recommends proportional compliance mechanisms and transitional support for businesses adapting to new regulatory requirements.
